TING-TING CHENG AWARDED FIRST EVER STUART HALL LIBRARY ARTIST'S RESIDENCY

Iniva (Institute of International Visual Arts) is delighted to announce that Ting-Ting Cheng has been awarded the first ever Stuart Hall Library Artist's Residency, a funded opportunity in collaboration with the Stuart Hall Foundation that builds on Professor Stuart Hall's unique contribution to intellectual and cultural life.

Selected via a hugely popular open call, Cheng will be in residence at Iniva's Stuart Hall Library from January to March 2017. During this time, she will revisit an audio recording of Stuart Hall speaking on BBC Radio 4's programme *Desert Island Discs* in 2000, using it as a springboard for exploring the concept of Britishness and the possibility of an utopian vision of our future in today's post-Brexit society.

The resulting work, presented as part of the library's thriving events programme, will take the form of an audio map which will guide audiences through the library and its classification system, converting the space into a 'desert island' where visitors follow the journey of the conversation around identity and diversity 16 years ago in the current context.

Speaking about the Residency, Melanie Keen, Director of Iniva, said:

"Iniva's Stuart Hall Library in east London, which houses our unique collection of books, catalogues and papers on contemporary visual arts from Africa, Asia, Latin America and the diasporas, sits at the very heart of our artistic programme. We are thrilled that we can announce Ting-Ting Cheng as the first recipient of the Stuart Hall Library Artist's Residency, a new strand in our ever growing programme which will further develop the role of our library as a repository of critical and creative exchange. Cheng's proposal demonstrated a deep engagement with Professor Stuart Hall's legacy and we very much look forward to working with her over the coming months."

The Stuart Hall Library Artist's Residency is a new funded opportunity organised in collaboration with the Stuart Hall Foundation. The residency gives support to an artist to purse their research at Iniva's Stuart Hall Library and produce a creative outcome which will be presented as part of the Iniva's programme.

About Ting-Ting Cheng

Ting-Ting Cheng was born in 1985 in Taipei. After graduating from BA Advertisement and PR at Fu-Jen University, Cheng moved to London and received her first MA on Photographic Studies from University of Westminster in 2009. After participating in a number of solo and group shows internationally, she graduated from MFA Fine Art at Goldsmiths College, London in 2014.

Cheng has had solo shows at Taipei Fine Art Museum, Galerie Grand Siècle (Taiwan), Identity Gallery (HK), Nomart (Japan), Addaya Art Centre and Luis Adelantado (Spain). Her group shows include the Bi-City Biennale of Urbanism\Architechture (Shenzen), III Moscow International Biennale for Young Art, KuanDu Museum (Taipei), National Taiwan Museum of Fine Art (Taichung), National Art Museum of China (Beijing), ARCO Madrid, Art 14 (London) and Singapore Art Stage.

She was shortlisted for the Taipei Art Award in 2011 and selected for MIT at Art Taipei in 2012. In 2015, Cheng was awarded Asian Exchange Prize by Asian Creative Award in Japan, and was commissioned by 19th Contemporary Art Festival Sesc_Videobrasil in Sao Paolo.
