## Biographies

**Victoria Sin** is an artist using speculative fiction within performance, moving image, writing, and print to interrupt normative processes of desire, identification, and objectification. This includes:

Drag as a practice of purposeful embodiment questioning the reification and ascription of ideal images within technologies of representation and systems of looking,

Science fiction as a practice of rewriting patriarchal and colonial narratives naturalized by scientific and historical discourses on states of sexed, gendered and raced bodies,

Storytelling as a collective practice of centering marginalized experience, creating a multiplicity of social contexts to be immersed in and strive towards.

Drawing from close personal encounters of looking and wanting, their work presents heavily constructed fantasy narratives on the often unsettling experience of the physical within the social body.

Their long-term project Dream Babes explores science and speculative fiction as a productive strategy of queer resistance, imaging futurity that does not depend on existing historical and social infrastructure. It has included science fiction porn screenings and talks, a three-day programme of performance at Auto Italia South East, a publication, and a regular science fiction reading group for queer people of colour.

**Taylor Le Melle** is a curator and writer based in London. Taylor's writing has been featured in anthologies such as: Gender, Space (Macmillian) ed. Aimee Meredith Cox as well as in periodicals such as Art Monthly. With artist Imran Perretta, Taylor has initiated not/no.w.here, an artist workers' cooperative. Taylor co-facilitates the Art Magazines Reading Group and alongside Rowan Powell, Taylor runs PSS, a publisher of printed material which has recently launched Daniella Valz Gen's poetry chapbook Subversive Economies and Victoria Sin's performance relic, A View From Elsewhere.

Hassan Vawda is the Guides Coordinator at Tate and a co-chair of Tate's BAME network. He is also an artist involved in programming and projects across multiple disciplines and an Aziz Foundation Scholar studying Community Development, looking at inclusion/exclusion within cultural and creative spaces, particularly faith-based creative expression. Currently finishing his MA in Applied Anthropology & Community & Youth Work at Goldsmith's University of London, he will start his PhD at Tate in October 2019.

Melanie Keen was appointed Director of Iniva in 2015. Melanie is an Independent Advisor to the Government Art Collection, sits on the British Council's Visual Arts Advisory Group and the Mayor of London's Suffrage Commission Group. Most recently, she was on British Pavilion Selection Committee for the 58th Venice Biennale. In a career spanning over 20 years, Melanie started her career as an assistant curator at Iniva has worked as an independent curator and consultant. Her curatorial projects include Figures of Speech for Film & Video Umbrella; and Oscar Muñoz: Mirror Image for Iniva. She was a curator at Iniva from 1997 to 2003 and projects include Yinka Shonibare's Diary of a Victorian Dandy. She has contributed to several publications and she also co-wrote Recordings: a selected bibliography of

contemporary African, Afro- Caribbean and Asian British art with Elizabeth Ward. Prior to joining Iniva, Melanie was a senior manager at Arts Council England.

**Priya Jay** is a researcher using curatorial, artistic and herbalist methods to develop a practice that is healing and experimental. Her background is in anthropology, with specific focus on digital and decolonial ecologies. She is interested in our collective futures and the question guiding this practice is, How can we (in allyship with our bodies, each other and the earth) be well? She co-runs Patchwork Archivists, formed out of a need to create and hold space for the histories within, across and between south asian diasporas. Priya has previously worked with Barbican, Iniva, Autograph ABP, Wellcome Trust and Approved By Pablo.

Simina Neagu is Programme and Operations Coordinator at Iniva and has previously worked with various arts organisations and artists including Chisenhale Gallery, Céline Condorelli, Rana Begum and Aleksandra Mir. Her research and writing is concerned with notions of translation, identity, diaspora and migration particularly in a post-socialist context. With curator Valentina Bin, she co-runs AfterHours, a series of workshops aimed at art workers. She was a commissioned writer for Gothenburg Museum of Art, Ujazdowski Castle Centre for Contemporary Art, and The Project Biennial of Contemporary Art, D-0 ARK Underground. Her writing was published in springerin, 3AM Magazine, Revista ARTA, and Kajet Journal among others.

**Tavian Hunter** is the Library and Archive Manager of Stuart Hall Library and as part of Iniva's artistic programme runs the Library's Research Network events. She has a keen interest in developing diverse library collections and recently published an article on the 'South Asian collection development at the British Museum' in Arts Libraries Journal (2019). Tavian was previously Senior Administrator and Librarian in the Department of Asia, British Museum and Collections Library Graduate Trainee at the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew. She completed her MA in Library and Information Studies at UCL in 2015 and holds a degree in Business Management and Information Management with Japanese from the University of Westminster.
